Year of Mission 26th Sunday in ordinary time.

We shouldn't grow possessive about the mission we are engaged in. We can fall into the trap of thinking that the proclamation of the kingdom, doing good, helping people and revealing love, belongs solely to those who confess Christ. But there are plenty who do good, and plenty of folk who love who wouldn't profess to be Christian. Should we stop them from doing good? Are we to stop

them from loving? No! Maybe we need to grow in an appreciation of where goodness is to be found in so many people around us, for there the presence of God is also to be found. Let's open our eyes this week to see the Lord at work in the lives of so many around us. Let's find his goodness and his love at work in and through them.

Gospel commentary for 26th Sunday in ordinary time.

Today's Gospel story covers an outsider casting out devils in Jesus' name. John took great pride in telling Jesus that they soon put a stop to it, but Jesus insisted that they should not have stopped him, because no one who works a miracle in Jesus' name is likely to be against him.

It is important not to stop someone from doing work in Jesus' name, but there is another issue that is even more important: it is about placing an obstacle in the way of a would-be disciple whereby that disciple is prevented from drawing closer to Jesus and Jesus sternly warned anyone who is an obstacle to one of his little ones. The word for "obstacle" in the Greek of the Gospels gives us the English word "scandal", but it originally meant a large rock or boulder which, if it was found lying in the middle of the road, would impede the travel of a pedestrian. This would definitely stop progress and we can see that Jesus would want to discourage anything that would become an obstacle to one of his disciples.

Is there a danger that we too can be a barrier to other people, those outside our normal circles? If so, might we be in danger of trying to keep the Lord out of sight of those of whom we don't approve?
